Dear Readers,

Aren't all the snowdrops magnificent this year? The colourful displays that are now appearing with crocuses and aconites in bloom (see our cover photo) also offer some welcome cheer after what has seemed to be a long winter and dreary with unusually cold weather. Fulbrook reached the dizzy depths of -11 degrees C on December 15th, with snow and ice which persisted for far longer that we should have liked. Only to be followed by a cold long dull dry spell, thankfully punctuated by a few sunny days and one or two very heavy downpours when we least expected them. Perhaps unrelated to this, or maybe as a consequence, there has been a nasty cough and cold virus that has sometimes persisted for weeks, yet more Covid infections and other bugs to keep us isolated in our homes. Coupled with the sudden high electricity and food costs it has been a challenging few months.

One of the really positive and lovely things to emerge from this bleak time has been the Warm Welcome Lunches in the Fulbrook Meeting Place which have been taking place every Thursday since mid November. This has grown from a few people trying it out to now 14 people or more coming together each week and enjoying a hot lunch of homemade soups and bread followed by cakes, tea and coffee. There is always a lot of chatting and plenty of laughter too. Some come regularly, others pop in when they can, but everyone is welcome and there is no need to book - just turn up. The lunches are free but donations are gratefully received. Do come and give it a try, lunch is from 12.30pm and the Fulbrook Meeting Place is the back half of the church which serves as our village hall - we should love to see you.

We should like to extend our sincere condolences to the families and friends of all those who have sadly passed away recently. In particular we remember Anne Hoyle who contributed much to the village and church for many years (see obituary on page 6), Michael Preston and Charlie Stevens. Our condolences also go to the family of Michael Clewett, an architect who lived in Fulbrook for some years and did work on a number of houses in and around this area. We also give our thoughts and good wishes to others in the village who have been ill or are waiting for operations and hope they will make good recoveries.

We have a number of events to look forward to and take part in, so watch out in the Newsletter for information about these so you can put the dates in your diaries. There will be the Spring Village Clean Up on Saturday 15th April, the Annual Plant Sale on Saturday 13th May, the Coronation of King Charles III on 6th May and the Village Summer Barbeque on 16th July.

Also to watch out for is that the bridge is to be repaired sometime in April (no confirmed date yet), but at the same time there will be some bollards installed to provide better protection for pedestrians on the bridge (see the Parish Council Report). The bridge is likely to be closed for two days while the work takes place.

The latest planning application for housing development on Cole's Field in Burford has yet again been refused but is likely to result in yet another appeal. This site is important not only because of its aesthetic contribution to the townscape from Fulbrook but also because of the complex underground springs on the site which are in delicate balance, the lack of adequate infrastructure at the sewage works and in other services to accommodate additional population which affect us all.

Finally we want to say a big THANK YOU to all our volunteer Distributors of this newsletter without whom you would not be reading this. Thank you to all of you.

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The Parish Council continues to work on your behalf to maintain our rural idyll. Regretfully, one of our councillors had to resign as her workload pressure just proved too much. Thus, we do have a vacancy. If you wish to put yourself forward, please contact our parish clerk.

The council was very pleased at the response to our consultation with you about the Burford/Fulbrook bridge, and we have decided to back the most realistic option which is to use road markings and flexible bollards to direct vehicles towards taking a central path over the bridge rather than edging too far towards pedestrians. We are also taking the opportunity to get the pedestrian footpath on the bridge properly tidied up to make it safer.

In addition, the parish council is applying for a 20mph speed limit on the A361 as it passes through the village. Speeding is the most occurring issue when consulting or speaking with you. With a fair wind in the right direction, we may stand a chance of achieving this!

The parish council has started to discuss housing needs in the village, and from informal discussions and experiences it seems that a few small houses are needed to meet the need for a) newcomers to Fulbrook who wish to purchase a small family home that they can afford, and b) to meet the needs of older residents who may wish to downsize but have a strong desire to stay in the village. 2023 is going to be a milestone year for the FaB WI. We have been in existence for 105 years and are part of the fabric of the area. This January we are starting an exciting new chapter when we change our location to the recently restored Burford Baptist Church in Witney Street. Nothing else will change; we remain the same open and friendly group of women we have always been, looking forward to many more years empowering women to expand their horizons.

Our first meeting for 2023 was an in-depth discussion and debate around four Resolution Options from which one will be chosen by the nation-wide membership for the Central National Federation to take forward. Our discussions took place initially in small groups where we took apart the various options looking for their importance to us here in Burford as well as the impact we, as a large lobbying organization, could bring to bear on the issues locally, nationally and internationally. As we have mentioned in the last report one of the four resolutions looking at water security was tabled by our own President, Jennie Craven, so our choice may be biased.

As a reward for such a serious January meeting we all met again on the 31^{st} of January at the Burford House Hotel for a very sociable New Year's Supper. We were given a very warm welcome by the staff and the food was simply delicious.

The FaB WI committee are already working on a wide ranging programme of talks, practical events and activities for the coming year. There will be something to cater for all interests and hopefully to tempt us all to try something new and as always there is a whole range of courses and activities run by the Oxfordshire Federation and Denman on Line to enjoy.

March brings our AGM which will be accompanied with the reward of a fun Beetle Drive and cake. Following the cake theme, in April 'The cake Tutor', Sally Davies, a lecturer at Birmingham University, will talk and demonstrate 'Vintage Cup-Cake Decoration'. There will be a hands-on activity for all. In May there is a talk from the Pearl Lady, Frances Carlaw, about this beautiful and eternally popular jewellery. Finally in June we are taking a Tree Walk around the Blue Cross grounds near Carterton. Plenty to look forward to

Anne Hoyle 1943 - 2022

MY MEMORIES OF ANNE HOYLE by Anne Weir

As soon as she retired, Anne settled down in Fulbrook. She was determined to become a member of the community.

The first opportunity for helping came with Fulbrook Church. From 1662 there were just three bells in the tower. Anne began an appeal to have a new bell-frame with a ring of six which was installed in 2004.

In the Fulbrook Newsletter for December 2007 there is an article by Anne about the bell-ringers, one of whom was Anne herself. She had even persuaded Tricia and Tony Picking to join. In the June 2014 Newsletter is a photograph of a new bell donated in honour of John Hoyle's Mother who was deaf. Around

the base is the inscription "He that hath ears to hear let him hear". Anne was the inspiration, but John was her faithful helper.

Anne was full of life. Once, when there was a Scottish country dance in Burford Church, she wanted to get it started and persuaded me to partner her in "The Dashing White Sergeant" and, when at John Anderson's funeral a selection of Scottish songs was played, she wanted me to hum the tunes out loud!

She was keen to join local groups like The WI and the Fulbrook Fellowship. Any "worthy thing" attracted Anne, especially to do with nature. She would drive me to a flower festival or even once made me buy a book about fungi.

Anne decided to have an allotment in Shipton. John, her husband and faithful help mate assisted with the heavy work. Once she bought too many raspberry canes to fit her section and she gave us the six spare which are still the best in our garden. Her own garden was tiny and we usually benefitted from her excess plants.

In 2011 on wandering through the churchyard a new idea came to Anne. She decided that certain areas that are near the wall are rarely used and so they have now been separated by a rope to prevent them being cut. She insisted that this was to allow us to examine the wild flowers, of which she had recognised 30 different types.

Anne and I were products of World War II. Our fathers were in the army. I was born just before and Anne during 1943. One year John and Jackie Harrington organised a jazz concert in the church. Anne and I were entranced, remembering our youth.

When Jim and I came to Fulbrook in 1977 I joined the Burford Methodist Church, the service of which was familiar to me as I was brought up in The Church of Scotland. However, I decided to go to our Fulbrook St James' Church (It starts earlier at 9.30 and it is lovely to hear the bells as you approach). Anne was brought up in The Church of England. One day I sat in a seat near the back and she tried to persuade me to move nearer to her. I didn't realise that historically this back pew was reserved for the Church Warden. I began to sit near Anne who offered to teach me how to sing the psalms. I began to notice that Anne was having difficulty with the page in the hymn book. Then, one evening during the Nativity Service on Christmas Eve, the door opened and Anne was standing there with the key looking lost and at this point I realised there was something wrong. She still came to church each week and I offered to accompany her. John suggested that to Anne, but she said "Not yet". She knew that she was suffering from dementia.

John continued to support Anne faithfully until she had an accident and damaged her wrist. She needed hospital treatment and it was decided that Anne should be cared for at Rosebank Care Home in Bampton. This was during the Covid time, so visiting was difficult. John visited, but eventually she didn't recognise him.

One last thing that Anne did for Fulbrook Church was to map the graves in the churchyard. John Radcliffe is full of praise for that. Anne had decided exactly where she'd rest there. It was fitting to hear the church bells ringing for her funeral.

Ram Babu 1938-2022

Many of us will remember fondly Dr Ram Babu who lived for some years here in Fulbrook at Elm Farm Barn. He sadly passed away in August 2022. He was a good friend of Fulbrook, always ready to help when the need arose. He loved Fulbrook, but moved due to illness to be nearer to family.

His good friend and partner Christine Neve wrote to us as follows:

One thing we all have in common is our love for Ram.

I know of countless examples of what a good doctor he was and how he loved his work. He really cared about his patients and about people in general.

I found him a kind, gentle and generous man with a good sense of humour - one of many things I already miss.

He shared with me how very proud he was of his daughters, and delighted in his grandchildren - not forgetting his sons-in-law.

I am very grateful that we were able to visit different parts of Europe. We really enjoyed our time travelling together and also the times we spent as a couple in our individual homes in Wales and England.

On a number of occasions in recent years Ram has said to me "I have had a good life".

I thank God that I knew Ram, and for his love and friendship. He will not be forgotten.

She also represented Fulbrook for the Burford and District Society, another responsible and high profile role. Members of the Fulbrook Fellowship, now the Fulbrook Forum, were grateful for the offer of her lovely garden in which to hold their annual strawberry tea parties.

Tricia is an opera lover and with her husband Tony became a friend of Longborough Festival. Every year she arranged for a group of us from the village to go to see one of the many performances in the annual programme. The evening was always a great success and we'd roll up at Longborough with picnics, in our finery, to enjoy the performance and the camaraderie.

Tricia will be sadly missed as she always took part in any village activity, among others organising quiz evenings in the Fulbrook Meeting Place and supporting all of the annual events. She is very community orientated and as a true 'Fulbrookian' we hope that she will carry on her interests and take some of the flavour of our village to her new environs.

Vita Sackville-West and Sissinghurst with James Bolton

The Arts and Crafts gardens created, in particular by Sir Edwin Lutyens and Gertrude Jekyll, set a standard against which English gardens would be measured for the next 60 years. Sissinghurst, created and gardened by Vita Sackville-West, novelist, poet and garden writer, and her husband, Harold Nicholson, from 1930 to her death in 1962, is the perfect example of this style; wonderful plantsmanship set within a framework of hedges and vistas.

This lecture looks at the life of Vita Sackville-West and the extraordinary garden that she created which nearly 60 years after her death continues to charm and delight.

Our speaker, James Bolton, set up a garden design business in 1992 and he now lectures extensively on garden history.

'Half the wealth of England rides on the back of sheep'

But how and why did that wealth arise, and what happened to it? These are small questions, with big and very interesting answers, that Richard Martin will attempt to supply.

'Thomas Willement, Gothic Revivalist & Oxfordshire

Discover Thomas Willement (1786 – 1871), a Gothic Revivalist Interior Designer who is often referred to as "the Father of Victorian Stained Glass", yet relatively few are aware of his work

Like many early 19th century provincial stained glass artists, he began as a plumber and glazier. The two jobs, now separate trades, being at that time linked because both required the skills of

working with lead. He became one of the most successful of England's early 19th century stained glass artists.

25th May at 7.30 pm - Carol Anderson - Zoom talk

'Over the hills to glory: the story of the Ascott Martyrs

The Ascott Martyrs were a group of women who were sent to Oxford Prison in 1873 for "rioting in Chipping Norton". These tenacious women were arrested for their role in attempting to persuade local farm workers to unionise but were later pardoned by Queen Victoria and returned home as martyrs.

Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire opens up new opportunities for volunteer advisers to provide vital support in the community

Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire is looking for volunteers from all kinds of backgrounds to support local people with their problems. Issues might include debt, housing, benefit and employment problems. With the increase in the cost of living, the need for more volunteers to help people is vital.

The West Oxfordshire charity supported 8,823 people last year to help resolve their problems. Every week the charity gives free, independent and confidential advice from trained advisers.

Volunteers are often looking for new ways to gain valuable experience and enhance their skills, or to enjoy the opportunity to work with and meet different people. They find it rewarding to support local people and make a difference to their lives.

Right now, Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire is looking for volunteers to become advisers. This involves taking calls, responding to web chat, meeting clients face-to-face, and working with colleagues to provide the best support possible for people who contact us. Each adviser works with each client to understand their individual needs, then, with professional support from qualified and experienced supervisors, undertake research to find the best advice to give.

A comprehensive training programme will be given. Generally volunteers are asked to contribute at least 8 hours per week, which can be done flexibly either in the central Witney office, our HUB on Station Lane, Witney, or even from your own home.

Citizens Advice volunteers come from all walks of life and choose to volunteer for a variety of reasons. They include students; people getting back into work after career breaks; people with part-time jobs; carers; and people who have retired. People simply need a desire to help.

Teresa Archer, Chief Officer at Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire said:

NEWS FROM FULBROOK CHURCH

and a Warm Welcome to All

Dear friends and neighbours,

It was wonderful to be able to share the joy of Christmas in a family carol and crib service with well over 100 people attending again this year, after the Covid restrictions of the previous two. We are also pleased that the Carpenters had carol singing for the village again this year - a lovely addition to our whole village celebrations.

During this winter there have been many factors which have made it very difficult for many people - the extra-cold weather, the cost of fuel, the continuing rise in the cost of food - even the most basic items, and shortages of some everyday items including eggs and milk. The Parochial Church Council was anxious to make sure that the church had a role in easing difficulties for villagers in whatever way it could. However, it was also faced with similar difficulties - the rising cost of fuel and costly maintenance of a 900 year building whose stone gets easily eroded by extremes of weather, but only limited income. (Please see the article in this issue by the Treasurer on the cost and funding of the church). An interesting solution was proposed - activities were already regularly held on Thursdays in the church, so why not extend these and have the church heating on all day, but just for that day, and on Sundays for the service. This resulted in **WARM WELCOME THURSDAYS** in the FULBROOK MEETING PLACE (the area at the back of the church which acts as the Village Hall). Keep Fit classes are held from 9-10am, coffee mornings follow once a month, the Fulbrook Forum meet periodically in the afternoons and the Parish Council and Parochial Church Council hold their meetings in the evenings.

The obvious gap in the programme was lunchtime, and so it was proposed to trial a weekly lunch, with homemade soups, bread, cake and hot drinks on offer to welcome anyone who wanted to come to share a hot meal and some company. This has been an absolute joy for all concerned and has now become a regular fixture at 12.30pm every Thursday. **Please do pop in and give it a try - you will receive a warm welcome from everybody there**. We are extremely grateful to all the people who make soups and bake bread and cakes each week. The lunches are free, but donations are gratefully received.

THERE ARE STILL FREE THURSDAY AFTERNOONS AVAILABLE FOR OTHER VILLAGE ACTIVITIES IN THE FULBROOK MEETING PLACE - Please contact Lyn Bibbings if you would like to use it. Lyn 01993 823640

The money from any donations received is split between the church (to help pay the heating bill) and BESOM. Besom is a Christian charity that bridges the gap between those in need and those that want to give - whether it be time, goods or money. The name Besom comes from the bundle of twigs to make a broom - a symbol of their intention to 'sweep away suffering'. They collect money and donated goods to put into food parcels for those who are struggling - after illness or accident, with the cost of living or in an emergency situation. They also collect furniture, baby clothes and children's clothes in good condition.

There is always a box in the church (and it's open every day) where donations of tinned and dry goods can be put - please donate something if you can. At the moment they are particularly keen to receive whole meals in a tin - for example chicken casserole, chilli con carne etc and tinned fruit, sponge puddings, custard etc. Besom is the local charity that we regularly support with money and goods, and we are so thankful to everyone who has given to this cause. Here's the latest recipe from our resident chef Peter Burns:

Ultimate sausage casserole

The responses to foggy mornings, bone chilling weather and scraping ice off the car windows has got to include dreaming about a traditional British sausage casserole! This classic winter warmer has a modern twist giving the umami a bit of a boost. Always buy decent sausages for this dish; get fabulous Kelmscott Farm sausages from Burford Co-op if you can't afford the wondrous sausages from Castle's the Butchers.

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp. sunflower oil
- 6 or 8 thick pork sausages
- 100g smoked pancetta (or smoked streaky bacon)
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 100ml red wine
- 1 x 400g tin chopped tomatoes
- 1 tsp. sweet smoked paprika
- 1 tbsp. tomato puree
- 150ml chicken stock
- 1 tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 tsp. toasted fennel seeds, crushed
- 1 tbsp. honey
- 2 sprigs rosemary, finely chopped
- 1 x 400g tin cannellini beans (drained)
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 1 tbsp. balsamic vinegar

Method

- 1. Heat the oil in a heavy, thick bottom pan. Add the sausages and cook for around seven to eight minutes, turning until browned all over (they don't have to be cooked, just nice and brown). Put the sausages to one side and put the pan back on the heat.
- 2. Add the smoked pancetta (or chopped streaky bacon) and cook for two to three minutes, until they begin to crisp up.
- 3. Add the onions and cook for a further few minutes, until they begin to soften, then finally add the garlic and cook for another couple of minutes.
- 4. Deglaze the pan by pouring in the red wine and letting it bubble using a wooden spoon to scrape in all the flavoursome bits and bobs from the bottom of the pan.
- 5. Add the chopped tomatoes, smoked paprika, tomato puree, chicken stock, Worcestershire sauce, bay leaves, fennel seeds, honey and rosemary, and the first round of salt and ground pepper. Stir to combine.
- 6. Add the sausages back into the pan and bring to a simmer. Loosely cover the pan and leave to simmer for about 20 minutes.
- 7. Stir in the cannellini beans and continue to cook for another 10 minutes until the sauce has thickened.

8. Remove from heat, check the seasoning and add a bit more salt and pepper if needed. Finally stir in the balsamic vinegar. Serve with fresh sourdough or other crusty bread to help indulge in this smoky umami winter warmer.

Extra ideas

I'm sure you could use cut up smoked streaky bacon as a substitute for the pancetta.

I've recently come across ham stock cubes. I reckon you could use half a ham stock cube and one chicken stock cube to make the stock a bit more interesting.

Good sourdough is in plentiful supply in Burford, but don't forget that the 'Bakery on the Hill' in Burford high street does wonderful bread for the sauce mopping up operation but get there early as it can sell out!

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
