When will Burford Bridge ever be repaired? 3 months' notice of road closure must be given so it looks as if it will be September at the earliest.

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This is my last report as Chairman. Malcolm Taylor took over as chair following our AGM on 11<sup>th</sup> May. I would like to thank all parishioners and Councillors for their support. I will remain on the Council to ensure a smooth handover.

Amenities Committee: given the difficulty in finding a chair for amenities, a new model has emerged where an individual takes responsibility for a single project like the village plant sale, and annual village clean up. This is working quite well so far. The plant sale has morphed into a mini village fete with new energy and new venue at the Carpenters a very welcome development.

Safety precautions for pedestrians crossing the bridge to and from Burford continue to give concern, and there have been a few very near misses and brushes with SUV wing mirrors. But the accident to the bridge wall has generated some very detailed correspondence with WODC and Highways dept regarding pedestrian safety, including the generation of several ideas. We are very grateful to Burford Mayor Peter Higgs, WODC Councillor Hugo Ashton and OCC Councillor Nicholas Field-Johnson for their continued support on the matter of the bridge. The speed of vehicles through the village continues to be a safety concern and based on this we have made application to Highways for a 20mph zone. This could be done within a three year timeframe but there has been some discussion as to its potential effectiveness with at least one parishioner expressing doubt. We may need to revisit our decision.

Following several discussions about housing requirements, the council considers a proper housing survey is needed. For example, at each end of the potential requirement is a) older people living in large houses who want to stay in Fulbrook by downsizing and b) young people with families wanting to live here in sensibly priced housing. A survey would put some science behind the musings and give us some empirical evidence going forward.

The children's playground continues to be on the Council's agenda and we are revisiting cost estimates for its refurbishment.

## Fulbrook News and Views

From the Editorial Team.....

#### A Secret History of Fulbrook

This is the penultimate story in this series and this time focuses on the area of the village around the War Memorial which is at the bottom of the hill from both the Chipping Norton and Burford directions. On one side of the War Memorial lies a large house called the The Limes. This house and the two adjoining cottages to the right of it were once owned by the Witney Union for use as a Workhouse, which it was until 1849. In that year the Workhouse including the two adjacent cottages was sold to a new private owner, Mr William Nunney of Burford. Some years later the cottages were sold off separately to the Workhouse building and were subsequently made into one property now known as Corner Cottage.

The War Memorial, made from Taynton Stone, was erected in 1922 to commemorate the lives of the seven men who lived in the village and were killed in the First World War. It was sited on a grassy area surrounded by two tracks and the A361. The Meadow Lane tracks were widened and surfaced with tarmac to create an island around the memorial. In 1950 the names of the four men who lived in the village who had been killed in the second World War were added and a square around the plinth was paved and surrounded by a wall with capstones. In 2007 £20,000 was raised by parishioners and further work was done to improve the setting of the War Memorial including planting a tree. An annual act of remembrance is held at the War Memorial at 9am on the Sunday nearest to November 11th, where the names of those who died in both wars are read out and honoured by those present, usually about 60 villagers, and the last post is played on a bugle. The Act of Remembrance is followed by a Service of remembrance in the Church.

Just opposite the War memorial lies Pytts House and Barn which was built on the site of one of the 'Manors of Fulebroc' listed in the Domesday Book, which was a manuscript record of The Great Survey completed in 1086. Once a farmstead with land and buildings this 'long hall' style 16th Century family house built of rubble stone with a Stonesfield slate roof has large rooms with high beamed ceilings and a Tudor fireplace. The oak door in the stone archway leads to a medieval pebble stone hallway. The house has a magnificent very old Wisteria along much of its facade and is a glorious sight when it is in flower.

Moving just into the A361 towards Burford is the site of the Methodist Chapel. A tiny Wesleyan Chapel opened in the village in 1861 and was situated on the north side of the road between Church Lane and Garnes Lane. No records of the chapel seem to have survived and by 1922 it was no longer in use. The building was demolished in 1957 to allow for road widening and it is thought that the only remains is a stone from above the doorway inscribed with a verse from the Bible which says "Where two or three are gathered together in my name there am I in the midst of them. Matthew XVIII 20. AD 1861". This stone is now set into the drystone wall above a bench, near to where the chapel was.

But is this the only remnant from the Chapel? I live in Garden House, Dolphin Lane, and my garden is on top of this stone wall. While gardening we found a stone, which looks like a mini gravestone with a curved top, about 30cm wide by 35 cm high. It is inscribed TS 1813 and underneath AS 1877 - is this also a remnant from the chapel? The first date is long before the chapel existed but the second date is not. It is much smaller than a normal gravestone - was there a graveyard associated with the chapel in any case? Or was it a commemorative stone of some other sort? Or maybe there are remains still hidden somewhere in my garden!

#### Lecture 14<sup>th</sup> June 2023: Donatello and the Sculpture of the Renaissance

#### A RUDE AWAKENING

In the early hours of Saturday morning 15th April around 1.50 am, there was an almighty bang, a car having smashed into the telegraph post outside my front door on the A361, Shipton Road, showering the house, once Fulbrook Church Primary School, built in 1874, the land having been purchased and the School built, funded by six local worthy citizens.

Little is known as to who was driving the car at the time. One can only assume it was joy riders, out for a spree, possibly in a stolen car, drunk or simply driving at breakneck speed, dangerously fast by the sound of the explosion, obviously caused from the impact when the car veered on to the grass verge and smashed into the telegraph pole, finally colliding into the metal rail which buckled under the impact. The rail in the past was there to prevent the children from running down the steps, through the gate and onto the road. At that time it was the only entrance to the school.

I really have to raise my hat to the men who helped to clear up the mess, starting with the police who seemed to arrive out of thin air shortly after 2.00am and then, for the rest of the day, the remarkable work carried out by, I think they were 'Western Power Distribution', and the electricity board. Firstly dismantling the telegraph wires and cables (which apparently, was all that was keeping the telegraph pole from falling over, it having been smashed through in two places). Then the removal, the disconnecting of the wires and cables, which were subsequently reconnected to the new telegraph pole, which by now had been installed. The work involved was remarkable, requiring an impressive level of workmanship, which took the rest of that eventful day to be completed.

#### Burford Ward District Councillor – Annual Report – May 2023

Thank you for electing me a year ago. It has been a very interesting year, up a steep learning curve, helped by Derek Cotterill and a very friendly and supportive set of fellow councillors.

The West Oxfordshire Alliance of Lib Dems, Labour and Green parties has worked well and constructively, and will continue with the same 9-strong Executive member team into the coming year.

My main committee workload has been attendance of the Uplands Planning Sub-Committee where we have considered around 40 applications brought to committee as major planning applications or where the planning officers' recommendations were at odds with the relevant town or parish council view. The two planning sub-committees also met twice as a combined Development Committee to consider major cross-District planning issues and the Mullin project application. It will also be the body that decides on WODC's consultation response on the Botley West solar farm application.

I have also been a member of two scrutiny committees – Finance & Management and Climate & Environment. I have to say that I have found them rather less influential than I would have expected, but this is perhaps because the new chairs and members have been finding their feet. My membership of these committees will continue.

My door (and email) are open to anyone wanting help with a District problem. During the year I have been (or still am) dealing with around 50 separate planning, licensing, housing or waste related queries and issues. It is easier for me to gain access to officers, than the general public, but not always! At least it is easier for me to demand a response!

I continue to work on the Ward issues that appear never to be resolved:

- Cole's Field: Helping to strengthen the case against, in anticipation of another appeal
- Burford bridge: Supporting Burford and Fulbrook in their attempts to improve pedestrian safety on the bridge over the Windrush
- Car parking: Working with BTC on expanding the Guildenford car park and making it more flood resilient
- HGVs: responding to the stakeholder consultation aspect of OCC's study into area HGV restrictions, with the first report expected imminently.

At a District level, I am working with the Executive member responsible (Lidia Arciszewska) on parking issues which will include EV charging points, and will engage in the development of the local plan which will be drafted this year. I will also take an active interest in the District response to the detailed plans for Botley West Solar Farm and the various planning and council tax initiatives that we hope will be made available when the Levelling up and Communities Bill becomes law.

#### NEWS FROM FULBROOK CHURCH

#### and a Warm Welcome to All

#### Dear friends and neighbours,

#### Warm Words

How lovely it is to see some warmer weather at last! As those of you who have been in the church on very cold days know, the church is not easy to heat or keep warm when the temperatures drop to near or below freezing, and oil is very expensive and burning it is not good for the environment. The **good news** is that the church has just had a new heating system installed!

The oil boiler that has been used to heat the church for very many years had reached the end of its life, and the Parochial Church Council had to make a decision about what heating system we could replace it with to be more effective, more environmentally friendly than oil and not ruinously expensive. The diocese was consulted and other churches visited that had alternative systems.

The current thinking is that trying to heat all the airspace in large buildings such as churches is a lost cause, and that it is much more efficient and effective to heat people rather than airspace. Best practice to achieve this seems to be to heat the pews. However, as our church is also our de facto village hall, half of the pews were removed and replaced with movable chairs so that the space at the back of the church could be cleared and used for other purposes. Therefore a pew only system would not work for us. We were advised that we could have a combination system of electric under-pew heaters, and convector radiators for the Fulbrook Meeting Place. These have the dual advantage of only needing to be turned on a couple of hours before the building is in intended use and being more controllable on automatic timers. There has also been a heater installed under the organ stool to directly heat the organist (who has often continued to play even though frozen in that draughty corner) and one under the vicar's pew, so hopefully everyone will feel the benefit.

The **bad news** is that, of course, all this has come at a large cost and the PCC has had to raid the piggy bank. We were able to secure some grant funds to help us pay the bill for these, but we still need to raise money to help us move towards balancing the books in the coming years. With this in mind, any surplus made from the Summer Barbecue to be held in the Church grounds on the afternoon of July 16th this year will go towards funding the heating in the church and hopefully we shall have a more comfortable place to be for all users this coming winter. #### Here's the latest recipe from our resident chef Peter Burns:

#### Slow roast shoulder of lamb with a Persian twist

This edition of your recipe comes with a wine pairing by Ryan and Siobhan at the Carpenter's Arms. Siobhan and Ryan kindly offered to pair one of their wines with this recipe. It was a bit of a challenge, because complex, sauced, spicy food needs a really carefully chosen wine to bring out the best in the flavours. They selected a 2021 Chilean red, available by the glass from their wine menu (details below).

Lamb comes into its own at this time of year and this slow roast recipe with a Persian twist will have you slavering for more! This fragrant recipe inspired by Persian flavours of walnuts, pomegranates and molasses and is easy to make. The long slow cooking really suits the shoulder cut and you will find that three hours will give you a joint that is soft and tender without going to the extremes demanded from 'pulled meat' recipes. I spent a couple of months in Iran several years ago and found the hospitality to be overwhelming... so this is a celebratory dish where formal dining must be forbidden and everything placed in the centre of the table for people to dig in, help themselves, and raise a glass of Los Tres Curas!

#### Ingredients

- 4 tbsp pomegranate molasses (if you don't routinely stock this exotica at home, boil and reduce some cranberry juice with a couple of spoons of sugar and a dash of balsamic vinegar as a substitute... or as a last resort, use honey and lemon juice).
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp ground cinnamon
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp ground turmeric
- 1 cinnamon stick
- juice 1 lemon
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 2 crushed garlic cloves
- 1 onion roughly chopped
- 130g walnuts semi-crushed in small pieces (before crushing them, toast in a dry frying pan... keep an eye on them as they burn easily!)
- 1 shoulder of lamb about 1.6kg, lightly scored in a large diamond pattern
- Few pieces of orange peel
- 200ml stock (chicken or lamb from a cube)
- 1 tbsp chopped parsley to garnish
- 1 tbsp chopped mint to garnish
- Seeds from 1 pomegranate
- Flatbreads or pitta bread (you know how much you will need)
- Simple leaf salad

#### Method

- 1. Heat oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 3
- 2. In a small bowl, make the glaze by mixing the molasses with cumin, cinnamon, turmeric, lemon juice, olive oil, walnuts, and garlic
- 3. Scatter the onion and orange peel over a casserole dish or a deep roasting tin
- 4. Place the lamb on top of the onions. Pour the glaze over the lamb and rub in in a bit (I'm sure it would be better to do this overnight, but I haven't tried it)
- 5. Rinse the bowl out with the stock, then pour it around not over the lamb

- 6. Cover the dish with a lid or the tin with a large piece of foil. Roast the lamb, undisturbed, for 3 hours
- 7. Remove the lid or foil and continue to roast for 30 minutes to give the lamb a bit of colour
- 8. When the lamb looks nice and brown, pour off the juices, remove as much fat as possible, then pour the juices back over the lamb
- 9. Sprinkle with the pomegranate seeds
- 10. Serve with warm flatbread or if you are using pitta (not Persian, but who cares) stuff the warmed pitta with lamb and salad

#### Wine pairing 'Los Tres Curas' (2021)

Ryan and Siobhan write "...This rich, vibrant expression of Carmenere is produced by Vistamar, 122km south of Santiago, in central Chile. The climate & terroir in this hot country produce full bodied, fruit forward wines with a moderate level of tannins. The Carménère grape is an ancient European variety that originates in the Médoc region of Bordeaux, France. Peter's Persian lamb dish needs a wine with body and length to match the rich flavours and spices. We feel the red fruits within this wine will work beautifully with his Middle Eastern inspired dish..."

Bon Appetit or 'noosh jan' as they say in Farsi!!


